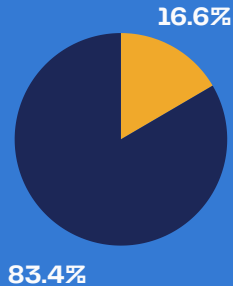

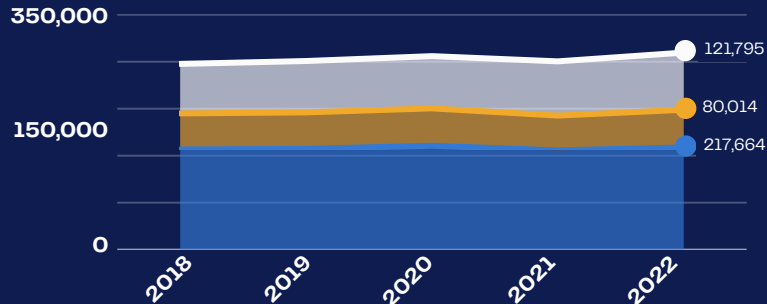

By positioning El Paso as a gateway to North American markets, BOSS strengthens local and international economic development.



EXPO MAEN 2024

Aguascalientes, MX

The FDI team showcased El Paso at Expo Manufacturing Automotive Enterprises Network (MAEN), one of Mexico's largest advanced manufacturing trade shows. Engaging with over 50 companies, they highlighted the city's strategic location, skilled workforce, cross-border trade advantages and other resources offered through the BOSS network. Their participation reinforced El Paso's role as a hub for manufacturing, technology and international commerce.



2024 MILESTONES

Q1

- Congresswoman Veronica Escobar appropriated \$500,000 in funding for BOSS site improvements.
- Hosted the *She Means Business Roundtable* by connecting women entrepreneurs to valuable resources and like-minded professionals.

Q2

- City Council approves Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with 20+ BOSS partners.
- City Council approves MOU with the Paso Del Norte Foundation to establish a 501(c)(3) organization.

Q3

- BOSS is awarded the National League of Cities grant: *Advancing Economic Mobility Rapid* for \$20,000.
- BOSS is awarded the International Economic Development Council Gold Award for *Recover, Resiliency & Mitigation*.
- Established the *Frontera Future Revolving Loan Fund* for downtown businesses.
